What is Vedanta?

Vedanta is the sixth school of thought as understood by various sages from the Indian subcontinent for over 5000 years.

Samkhya: Sage Kapila analyzed the material world and consciousness.

Yoga: Sage Patanjali focused on the practical application of spiritual disciplines to attain liberation from suffering.

Nyaya: Sage Gautama focused on logic and reasoning to attain valid knowledge.

Vaisheshika: Sage Kanada focused on the analysis of the material world and the nature of reality.

Mimamsa: Sage Jaimini focused on rituals prescribed in the interpretation of the Vedas.

Vedanta: Sage Vyasa focused on the interpretation of the Upanishads and the Bhagavad Gita with emphasis on the ultimate reality of Brahman and self-realization that leads to liberation from suffering.

All these schools of thought have contributed significantly to the development of Indian philosophy and have influenced many aspects of Indian culture and spirituality.

Each has a highly developed logical analysis and arguments for their point of view. Vedanta has evolved from these schools and developed a methodology that has been passed down by the Guru to

Shishya - the Teacher to Student system.

The four Vedas are authoritative texts in the Vedic corpus, foundational to Sanatana Dharma, the basis of the Hindu religion, accumulated and recorded over 5000 years ago with no attributable author. The collection of hymns and ritual texts are divided into four sections: Rigveda, Samaveda, Yajurveda, and Atharvaveda. The Upanishads are a collection of philosophical and mystical texts that form the concluding part of the Vedas. The Katha Upanishad, which has been the focus of our regular Sunday meetups, is one of the most important and influential Upanishads in Hinduism, and it is known for its profound philosophical and spiritual insights. The central theme of the Katha Upanishad is the nature of the Self (Atman) and its relationship to the ultimate reality (Brahman).

The Upanishad presents the story of a young boy named Nachiketa who, through his intense desire for knowledge and truth, seeks out the god of death, Yama, and asks him to reveal the secret of immortality. In response, Yama teaches Nachiketa the nature of the Self and the ultimate reality.

The Upanishad teaches that the Self is not the body, mind, or intellect but is an eternal, unchanging, and all-pervading consciousness that is identical with the ultimate reality (Brahman). It teaches that the ultimate goal of human life is to realize this truth and to experience the unity of the Self with Brahman. Through this realization, one can overcome the cycle of birth and death and attain liberation (Moksha).

Therefore, the Katha Upanishad can be seen as a guide to experiencing reality, as it teaches the path to self-realization and liberation. By understanding the nature of the Self and its relationship to the ultimate reality, one can attain a state of consciousness that transcends the limitations of the body and mind and experiences the ultimate truth of existence.




